


## Framing Easel Paintings Materials – Suppliers – Resources

## Reverse of Properly Framed Painting, Backing Board, and Hanging Hardware



- 1. Back of a traditional picture frame
- 2. Backing board attached to stretcher with screws and washers
- 3. "D" rings to hang painting
- 4. Brass mending plates screwed into frame to secure the painting
- 5. Rubber spacers for air circulation

Tape for lining frame rabbets:

CR Laurence Black 1" Wide Moleskin Channel Liner (synthetic fabric with a pressure sensitive adhesive on one side; the 1" width divides into  $\frac{1}{4}$ " wide strips)

Framing Hardware – Mending plates and offset clips (aka z-clips) Brass coated steel mending plates Galvanized steel offset clips

Hanging Hardware – picture wire, d-rings, wall hooks Plastic coated, stainless picture wire Zinc plated steel d-rings

Monofilament for securing stretcher keys

#### **Backing boards:**

4 mm Coroplast® -natural color (corrugated virgin polypropylene backing board)

To attach the backing board, the ICA uses  $#8 \times \frac{1}{2}$ " Phillips head lath screws (aka washer screws). You can also use a washer and screw system.

The purpose of either system is to keep the screw from going through your board.

#### Glazing:

Acrylite® OP-3, Plexiglas® UF 5, or Tru-Vue Optium® (UV-filtered acrylic glazing) Tru-Vue Optium has many options for non-reflective and scratch resistant acrylic glazing
Guidelines for choosing thickness of acrylic glazing: Shortest dimension up to 40" – 1/8" Shortest dimension between 40" x 60" – 3/16" Shortest dimension above 60" – <sup>1</sup>/4" These guidelines assume standard proportions. If you have a painting that is 40" x 84", you'll want thicker glazing than 1/8".
Tru-Vue Conservation Clear® (UV-filtered glass glazing) or Museum Glass® (UV-filtered and non-reflective)

## Soft brushes:

Badger hair brushes (i.e. Badger blenders used by oil painters) Goat hair brushes (i.e. Hake brushes used by watercolor painters)

### High Density Sponges:

**Qosmedix Sponges (latex free, polyurethane cosmetic sponges)** 

Watercolors:

Winsor and Newton half pans Schmincke half pans
